This piece centers on the grief and suffering of Mary, Mother of Jesus, but also her example of faith, acceptance and hope in the Resurrection. It will feature soloists and the choir, accompanied by a chamber ensemble and organ. The moving and dynamic music includes sections from the 13th century prayer, Stabat Mater, the Epic of Gilgamesh and a poem by Rumi, and many lyrics are in Arabic, Aramaic, Greek and Latin. It is dedicated to all families who have suffered the loss of a child.



The Easter Season Continues through Pentecost Sunday, May 20th

Easter is the celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death, expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor. 15:14)

Choose a Sacred Space

Our columbarium has been installed for about a year and a half now. It offers to those opting for cremation an alternative to in-ground inurnment. It could be considered a mini-mausoleum. It contains 80 urn niches, 40 of which are for a single inurnment, while the other 40 are for companion inurnment. It is a beautiful structure of gray and deep red granites. Provision is made for Memorialization by use of bronze scrolls. Small bronze vases (optional) are also available. Call 658-7017.

Pastor's Notes

Living Branches

The Gospel and second reading for this Fifth Sunday of Easter emphasize the need for us to remain in Christ, and he in us. This shared life finds expression in the image of the one vine and many branches. We become living branches of the vine, members of the Body of Christ through baptism, Eucharist, and confirmation, sacraments of sharing God's own life. The First Letter of John describes the fruit of this vine as active love of neighbor: "And his commandment is this: we should believe . . . and love one another" (1 John 3:23).

Our first reading from Acts shows us an example of someone who shares in Christ's life in the person of Saint Paul. Paul's fearless witness, even at the risk of his life, is proof to everyone that the risen Lord's Spirit truly fills him with life and is bearing fruit in him.
